







Analysis of the Students Feedback Survey:

The students were asked to indicate their feedback, perception on five-point Likert scale of the degree of strongly agreeing, agreeing, neutral, disagreeing, and strongly disagreeing where 5 point was given to strongly agreeing, 4 to agreeing, 3 to neutral, 2 to disagreeing, and 1 to strongly disagreeing. Conclusions:

Chart No.: 1 and 2 and Table No.: 1 demonstrates that the mean scores of the Arts and Commerce College Warwat Bakal, students stating their responses about the 16 statements based on five-point Likert scale about teaching and learning environment provided by the institutions between degree of strongly agreeing and strongly disagreeing. The mean scores of the responses between the degree of strongly agreeing and strongly disagreeing held by all students for all statements ranged from 3.16, 3.77, 4.22, 4.37, to 4.41 and so on, with an average mean score of 4.20 for all 16 statements. The statement, 'Separate common rooms for girls and boys are available', had scored a highest average mean of 4.41, another statement, 'Equipment's in the lab, projector in classrooms, computers and books in library are in good working condition', had scored average meaning of 4.37 which means that respondents are strongly agreeing with this statement, whereas the statement, 'The functioning of the placement cell in the college is satisfactory' had scored lowest average mean of 3.16 where the respondents preferred to remain neutral on this statement. If we considered the respondents responses average mean of 4.20 for all 16 statements, then we can state that the respondents are satisfied with teaching and learning environment provided by the institutions to them.

Chart No.3 and Table No.2 demonstrates the responses of Arts students' feedback collected on the

basis of rating that they had given to the parameters that are mentioned in the above table no. 1, on five points Likert scale. The mean score of student's responses towards the parameters about the teaching of teachers in college states that the teacher encourages students for asking question, discussion, and classroom participation with an average mean of 4.34, teachers are fair and transparent in internal assessment with an average of 4.35, with an average means of 4.30 respondents stated that teachers are sincerity and are socially committed towards their profession, teachers makes topics easy to understand, generate interest and conducts students centric learning activities with an average mean of 4.25, teachers are communicating effectively with the students with an average mean of 4.17, whereas with an average mean of 4.25 respondents states that teachers provide us information about the syllabus, scheme, our expected ability, course outcomes and outcomes of course programmes.






Figure 2.1: Monthly Electrical Energy Consumption





Figure 3.1: CO2 emission due to usage of electrical energy.






Figure 2.1: Month wise energy consumption




Figure 2.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 3.1: Month wise CO2 Emission






Out of total students coming to Institute, about 60% students use own Automobile.


6.2 Usage of Public Transport
